V. Public Comment

Chairman McNeill opened the floor for the Public Comment portion of today's meeting at 9:02 am.

Steve Trinkle from the Todd community took the podium. He stated that he was there in his capacity as a Board of Directors member for the New River Conservancy. He also stated that the New River Conservancy offers solutions and consultative services to land owners that have land along the riverfront to make sure that any activities that take place are in compliance with flood plane mitigation. Steve said that the Conservancy understands that there's an item on the agenda for later in the day and that the county has issued a violation. He stated that the Conservancy works closely with Planning Director Matthew Levi and fully supports protocols and regulations of the flood plane management. He stated that if they could be of service in anyway to help with any homeowners they would be happy to do that, but we do stand fully and support the county's decisions regarding this particular notice of violation.

Richard Sullivan from Lansing also took the podium. He stated that he was here with his wife Nancy. We split our time between Lansing and Winston Salem. Our family has

owned property up here since 1964. We are directly across the river from the violation that has been noted and we watched this happen. There's a jetty in the river, which does alter the flow of the river and we watched the property owner build that jetty and put the concrete into the river. He relocated rocks from the river, cemented it in place to create a jetty which has repercussions and impact along the river, that has been exacerbated during the heavy flooding that we have had, not only in Helene, but in some of the heavy rains after. The jetty has adversely affected and ultimately destroyed riverbank stability and habitat on both sides of the river, as well as affecting adjacent down river properties. The damage created by this jetty and the altered flow of the river has caused significant land and structural repairs for land owners adjacent to and across from the jetty. The necessary repairs caused by the damages have demanded significant financial expenditures for the impacted landowner's. Last, but certainly not least there is a safety hazard created with this protrusion hazard that is present at all times for floaters, canoes, and kayaks that have to navigate around the structure, but the hazard is greatly increased when the water level is elevated and covers the jetty. It is an impossible for people to see the damage on the river and the danger ahead, which could result in serious injury. We fully support the immediate removal of this structure for the above reasons. Our hope is that the commissioners of AsheCounty will set forth a ruling that forbids the alteration of the river and its banks in anyway, including the creation of any structure or jetty from this day forward. Thank you.

Kathy Gorton (Turner) took the podium and stated she was the one who filed a recent complaint and provided a video of the May flooding that had nothing to do with Helene. She said they have since had an environmental engineer out to their property. She stated what is happening with the wall is the jetty is causing turbulence in the river. There's nothing to slow it down. She gave a lengthy description of how the jetty built by Mr. Russo has caused turbulent destruction on her property. She stated she did see a concrete mic=xing machine on Mr. Russo's property when he was constructing the jetty. She stated that her engineer told her that to repair her property would cost \$38,000 to offset for the future, and that also includes trying to save trees that Helene did not take. And the damage caused by the jetty is a safety issue.

Seeing no movement from those in attendance Chairman McNeill closed the Public Comment portion of the September 15th, 2025 meeting at 9:11 am.

Nick Farmerie, Community Development Director & Assistant County Manager presented the Board with an Appeal Of Notice of Violation. He gave a brief overview of the timeline and the ordinance in question for the property located at 1228 Riverview Trail Road,

Lansing. On June 26, the Floodplain Administrator received a complaint regarding unauthorized fill material—including large rocks and a concrete jetty—altering the natural flow of the North Fork. An investigation conducted on July 3 and documented on July 21 confirmed the presence of fill material within the designated floodway. This constituted a violation of Ordinance 151.44(a), which prohibits encroachments such as fill, new construction, and other developments in the floodway. A formal Notice of Violation was issued on July 29.

A hearing was held with the property owner, attended by the Floodplain Administrator and the 911 Coordinator. The property owner appealed the violation, triggering adjudication by the Ashe County Commissioners. Despite the property owner having obtained a permit from the Army Corps of Engineers, the development remains in violation of local floodplain regulations, which must be upheld independently to maintain compliance with the National Flood Insurance Program. Witness testimony also indicated the presence of uncured concrete in the river, raising additional concerns under state water quality laws.

The situation poses potential risks to neighboring properties and could jeopardize flood insurance eligibility for Ashe County residents. Coordination with state agencies, including the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality, is recommended to address broader regulatory concerns. Commissioner Eldreth made the motion to deny the appeal and to include any agency that has jurisdiction in the matter. Commissioner Greene seconded the motion. The motion passed with unanimous approval.
