
The project will create a new 41.7-acre industrial park in Ashe County containing 5 sites ranging in size from 2.2 to 13 acres each. This project will attract new, high-quality manufacturing jobs to Ashe County, which is a rural mountain community with a population of 27,109. Construction will include an 1,100-foot publicly owned access road, approximately 1,150 linear feet of 6-inch water main, 1,120 linear feet of 8-inch gravity fed sewer main, 1,500 linear feet of gas line, and telecommunications infrastructure. Construction is estimated to cost \$1,380,974. The project location is 1.25 miles away from a 4-lane divided highway.

Ashe County purchased the property for \$950,000 in August 2020. Engineering due diligence found no barriers to development at the property. If funded, construction will begin in August 2021 and finish in February 2022. The County will retain ownership of all five sites at the new industrial park. Sites will be sold at fair market value. Ashe County has a full-time economic development professional who will develop a detailed marketing strategy for the industrial park. The North Carolina Department of Commerce has designated Ashe as a Tier 2 distressed county.

Describe how the project will meet the proposed outcomes checked in the *Expected Project Outcomes* section. How will progress and success be measured? What specific data or documentation will be used and/or collected to measure outcomes? (Word limit 150)

Ashe County currently has no suitable sites to market to prospective industrial companies. This absence of sites has artificially constrained industrial growth. Manufacturing is one of the few sectors in Ashe County's economy that offers residents a living wage. Data from the 2018 American Community Survey indicates that 52% of employed Ashe County residents work in a sector paying an annual median salary less than \$25,000. Significant manufacturing growth is needed, but recruitment has proven difficult without shovel-ready sites. This project will remedy that deficiency. The project's outcomes will be measured by the amount of private sector investment, the number of new jobs, and the average annual wage of jobs that the industrial park attracts. These outcomes will be easily measurable as companies locate at the park. A professionally developed economic impact analysis of the park estimated that it could create 322 new jobs and attract \$36,800,000 in construction investment.

Golden LEAF FOUNDATION

Ashe County will own the new industrial park and market it to prospective companies. The County has a full-time economic developer on staff. Her primary focus will be marketing and recruitment for the industrial park. The Town of West Jefferson will assume long-term maintenance responsibility for the access road and new water and wastewater infrastructure at the industrial park. Piedmont Natural Gas will assume long-term maintenance responsibility for the new natural gas pipeline installed as part of the project. Golden LEAF funds will not be used to substantially grade or improve individual sites. Instead, funds will be used for public improvements that will serve the entire industrial park.

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

The livestock center will be self-sustaining from a fee charged per head of cattle sold. This method is profitably used by all commercial livestock markets.

Currently, a readily accessible and unrestricted large space that can seat a large number of attendees does not exist in the four counties. The combination of a first class show ring, conference center, and handling facilities will give the center the ability to host events, educational workshops, demonstrations, etc. that would draw livestock producers, Christmas tree growers, and other farmers from an area much larger than the four-county region. While many events will be free, some will charge a registration/entrance fee, a portion of which can be applied to the use of the facility for utilities and upkeep.

Otherwise, being a County-owned center, the County budget will cover maintenance and expenses-which is not expected to be excessive-that rise above event income.

Ashe County government works to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens, provide economic opportunity, enhance the quality of life, support education, and protect property. Ashe offers services typical of county governments- law enforcement, solid waste disposal, building inspections, parks and recreation, etc. Ashe County has successfully overseen construction of numerous county and school buildings over the years, including a law enforcement center in 2010. The County recently finished construction of a fire training facility.

In 2017, Ashe County farmers began gathering informally to plan for the proposed facility, which was formalized in September 2019 when the commissioners formed an Agricultural Center Steering Committee. In 2018, grant applications were made to Goldenleaf, ADFPTF, and Tobacco Trust Fund. Goldenleaf invited a full application, while ADFPTF funded a feasibility study. Consequently, the Goldenleaf and Tobacco Trust Fund applications were withdrawn pending completion of the study.

Equipment

A significant amount of equipment will be needed for the livestock facility- gates, panels, squeeze chute, and scales. This line item also includes non-structural features in the conference center- chairs, tables, kitchen equipment, AV equipment, and dry erase boards.

The Ashe Community Paramedic Program delivers high quality primary care and preventive services for our medically vulnerable population. It does this by increasing access to healthcare services through the services of specially trained EMS personnel in an expanded role.

The services incorporate programs to improve preventable hospital stays such as chronic disease management, assessment and personalized approaches to fall prevention, integration of primary and behavioral health as well as culturally adopted health care education. The services provided include, as appropriate and guided by individual PCPs:

- -Individual assessment of needs including physical, behavioral, educational, home safety, fall prevention, care coordination, social services and transportation.
- -Direct healthcare services such as immunizations, diabetes care, lab work, monitoring of B/P and other vitals, EKG, Flu shots, medication reconciliation, medication administration, oxygen saturation monitoring, weight monitoring, wound care, and wellness screening.

Many of the patients are tobacco-dependent, economically distressed, and live in our rural community of Ashe County. The primary goal of any healthcare model is to put patients first and focus on their general and specific needs at no cost to the patient, since the program started in 2018 has been exactly what we have done.

Our goals were developed to improve the health of Ashe and bridge the healthcare gaps by choosing the top health issues in our County and decreasing the negative. To accomplish our mission we chose goals based on the top healthcare concerns/issues in the community. Our goals are as follows: Blood pressures reaching optimal range for 60% of hypertensive patients. Accomplish with 90% of enrolled patients.

Improve medication compliance for 80% of referred patients. We have accomplished this with 88% of our patients. Reduce Hospital and ED admissions rates by 10%. We have a 72% reduction in hospital admissions rates and a 61% reduction for ED admissions for referred patients.

10% reduction in 911 calls for referred patients. (Not Yet Evaluated)

The Lost Province Center requests \$485,250 to establish three Apprenticeship Programs. Each program will provide work-based training, industry certification and a career track for skill acquisition and will provide students with career opportunities. Apprenticeships will be offered in Culinary Arts and Glassworks, Music (banjo, guitar, fiddle) and/or crafts (luthiery, metalworks, woodworking). Each Apprenticeship track will include business education.

The focus will be marketable, future-oriented, creative skills AI & machines cannot replicate, that support small business and industry, and that boost small business development, increasing the number of jobs retained and created in the County. Apprenticeships will be designed to increase earning power and opportunities.

We will design, build, market, and staff the programs, aligning the curriculum with industry certification requirements and meaningful career opportunities.

Lansing, a rural, economically disadvantaged community benefits. Lansing ranks significantly lower than the county and nation on several economic measures: 49.4% of Lansing residents live below the federal poverty level compared to 18% in Ashe County; the Median Household Income is 43% of the national rate; Income per Capita is \$17,076 (57% of the national rate); Unemployment at 49.4% is 2.7 times higher than the national rate; and only 69.2% graduate from high school.

We will track and document each skill set, credential, certification, or license earned from each apprenticeship or career track. Available data on students participating in work-based learning in Ashe County will be compared to the same data at the end of our three-year project.

We will gather data by industry for each apprenticeship area, logging certificates, licenses and industry certifications earned through our Apprenticeship program and comparing the increases with currently available data on credentials for the Ashe County/Lansing area from Apprenticeship NC.

We will log the number of students receiving meaningful exposure and opportunities to explore local career paths. We will look for an increase in income and employment by age group using census/bls data and we will use surveys of students who have completed the program three, six and twelve months after completion, to subjectively assess the program's effect on employment or other opportunities in the local community.



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Describe plans to sustain funding for the project beyond the grant. (Word limit 150)

The Lost Province Center financial model includes four program areas: arts, crafts, music, and culinary, each providing marketable products and services. The financial model also has three lines of business: education, retail (a restaurant and gallery/gift shop), and hotelier (30 studio-type short-term rental units). Lost Province Arts will have multiple income streams from the above, including tuition and fees, room and board, short-term rental income, retail sales, restaurant income, and art supply and material sales. The historic Lansing school and the gallery will also serve as an event venue. And there will be ongoing fundraising, partnership events and performing arts events in support of the operation.

A feasibility study and market analysis will be performed by Virginia Tech in early 2021 to further refine the business plan and ensure a competitive business model to support ongoing operations.

The Lost Province Center was formed June 2018 by an experienced Board of Directors to revitalize the Lansing school, celebrate Southern Appalachian culture and support the local community through education, workforce development, and economic development. 2018 and 2019 were dedicated to planning and acquisition of the property which was acquired in July 2020. Engineering studies were funded and conducted.

Ongoing efforts include cleaning and stabilizing the structure, vacant for over 20 years, funding architectural services, funding a feasibility and marketing study, and beginning operations. The objective of this grant is to launch Apprenticeship programs, the cornerstone of our education program and the driver of multiple income streams, and to serve as an economic and rural development tool for Lansing. Apprenticeships will be designed by subject experts with apprenticeship design experience. (We recognize that some or all classes may need to be virtual during the pandemic and we are planning accordingly.)
